## MARK LINDSAY '72 Contributes to Campaign to Ensure Pike Legacy

#### Dreams of Alumnus

#### Take Flight as He Honors His Father

**I** took my first breath in an Air Force base hospital in Washington, D.C. With a WWII AAF fighter pilot as a father, some would say my path to becoming a pilot was predestined. I did not have to venture far from home to find my hero." **Mark Lindsay '72** received a Navy ROTC scholarship to Purdue in 1967 and joined Pi Kappa Alpha.

Mark is grateful for the experiences he gained by becoming a Purdue Pike and believes those experiences were instrumental in forging parts of his adult life. He values his memories of "box-ball," Juanita's chocolate chip cookies, and football Saturdays. "I have been privileged to enjoy the Pi Kappa Alpha experience and encourage other brothers to support the *Honoring Our Legacy, Securing Our Future* campaign. Beta Phi taught us how to manage success, as well as failure. We worked and played as a team. That experience would prove invaluable in my aviation career." After graduation, Mark fulfilled his dream of following in his father's footsteps by becoming a pilot.

Mark served as a naval aviator from 1972 to 1979. He was heavily involved in aircraft carrier ops, flying the A-6E Intruder and logging 167 arrested landings, as well as training fellow pilots as squadron landing signal officer. After seven years and 2,300 completed flight hours, Mark joined the ranks of American Airlines. He was based in New York and Washington, D.C., flying McDonnell Douglas and Boeing aircraft on domestic and international routes.



Mark Lindsay '72 followed his father's footsteps by flying in Florida this year, 68 years after Lt. Hugh Lindsay flew in England in 1944.

After retiring as captain from American Airlines, he recently accomplished one more long-standing aviation goal. "It was amazing to hear, smell, and feel the fighter my dad flew in combat over Europe. Flying the venerable P-51 Mustang was an amazing experience. I flew the beautiful, powerful and sleek bird in all regimes of flight. It was an experience that solidified the notion that the 299 combat hours he logged as a 21-year-old fighter pilot during wartime was my dad's contribution as a member of our country's Greatest Generation. I am so grateful to have followed in his footsteps and honor his legacy."

Joe always makes an effort to spend time with his Pike brothers. "We really don't know how valuable our time is. The older I get, the more I appreciate the time I get to spend with friends and family. On a recent business trip to Colorado, I was able to have dinner with my best man,

I even had dinner with **Russ Strobach '84** in Lafayette recently and I communicate with one of my best friends, **Greg Louis '85**, almost every week."

Joe has remained very active with Beta Phi Chapter. He serves on the home association and as Chapter advisor, organizes Pike Old Masters, and assists with the golf outing. "Every brother I have talked to that is returning for the first time always mentions that they wish they had not stayed away for so long. Brother, if you don't keep in touch, you're missing out big time."

Joe encourages alumni who have lost touch with the

Chapter to come back and visit the Chapter House. "Our location and tradition set us apart from everyone else. I want the Chapter House to remain a great place to visit when alumni visit campus. The Chapter House is our legacy and it is our window into our past. I want to look at that building and continue to remember the great times. Everything we do is

made easier if more people participate. We need the capital campaign to be successful so that we will dominate the Purdue Greek system for another 90 years." Joe strongly encourages brothers to give in order to preserve the Pike legacy. "For those who have made contributions to the capital campaign, thank you. For those that haven't, c'mon, man!"

Joe earned his bachelor's degree in supervision, which Purdue now terms organizational leadership. He is a region sales manager for Landstar Transportation Logistics. "If you can manage, supervise, and discipline the guys you live with, doing those same things in the business world is a breeze. We all tend to be molded by those around us. In the early 1980s, when I was in the Chapter, Beta Phi was winning Smythe Awards. We were at the very top of Purdue in virtually every measurable activity. 
## CHAPTER FOCUSES ON KEY OBJECTIVES FOR PIKE

So far, our progress toward these goals is very positive. Recruitment finished strong with a pledge class of 25 men. The class is already making an impact on Purdue's campus. Each new member has been active in fraternity athletics, has competed in Greek philanthropy events, and participated in Purduesponsored community service. I am very encouraged by the quality of individuals that we

have recruited the past 18 months. The Chapter has come to consist of the very best students, leaders, athletes, and gentlemen. We will initiate them at the end of November.

The Chapter is currently ranked first in fraternity athletics! This semester, Pike has dominated on the grid iron, the volleyball court, and in the pool. Our first annual Pike Fireman's Challenge philanthropy was Sunday, September 9. The event was immensely successful and we received substantial participation from both the Purdue Fire Department and the Greek community. With more than 200 people in attendance, the event
