Sorrowful and difficult circumstances can sometimes inspire a wave of thoughtfulness and generosity. Since our last publication, our Beta Phi family has experienced two such notable occasions.

We recently lost Charlotte Hetrick, wife of **Charlie Hetrick '63**. Charlie is one of the founding fathers of the Beta Phi Foundation, and he remains an integral part of our regular meetings and other events. The Foundation, with the approval of Charlie and his family, are announcing the creation of the Charles & Charlotte Hetrick Scholarship.

Many of us brothers truly understand that without the support of our wives and family, we would not be able to dedicate our time to the Chapter. Charlotte was no exception. She was supportive of Charlie and the time he has devoted to Beta Phi. This scholarship is now fully funded and will be self-funded and perpetual, and it will be awarded for the first time during our reunion on October 10, 2020. In recognition of Charlie's character and Charlotte's support, the scholarship will be awarded to a member living in the house who has demonstrated outstanding leadership in the internal operations of the Chapter through financial management, risk management, and facility management. We are honored and delighted to know that Charlie will be with us to award this scholarship this fall.

Recently, the Beta Phi Foundation had been planning to announce a fundraising campaign to fully fund our

Chapter's tutoring program. Since the advent of the tutoring program, more than 10 years ago, our Chapter GPA has risen from 2.65 to over 3.10 and has remained above 3.0 for the last several semesters. It is our intent to fully endow that program so it will be fully funded and perpetual. We believe it would require \$140,000 to make that a reality.

Another example of Beta Phi thoughtfulness and generosity arrived in March with the notification that Brother **Charles Glasgow '48** had passed away. Brother Glasgow, through his wife, Johanna, and his estate, has generously donated \$80,000 to the Beta Phi Foundation. In conjunction with this lead donation, we are kicking off a campaign to fully endow the tutoring program. Our goal is to achieve this objective by the fall semester of 2022, marking our 100-year anniversary celebration. The foundation board approaches such campaigns with a cautious optimism, especially following the recent alumni generosity toward our Chapter capital campaign. However, with the catalyst of Charles' generosity, we are ready to take on the challenge with 57% of our endowment goal achieved.

We issue our sincere and heartfelt condolences to the Hetrick and Glasgow families, and we are truly humbled by their generosity. The Beta Phi Foundation has always done everything possible to be wise stewards of the contributions and resources entrusted to us—and will continue to do so. A contribution to the Beta Phi Foundation, in support of endowing the Chapter tutoring program, would be tax deductible since the foundation has a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt IRS status.

As you consider your personal philanthropy, we ask you to consider joining the Hetricks and Glasgows in supporting our outstanding undergraduates.

Make October 10 a date to join us at the Beta Phi Chapter House, and if you're unable join us this year or next, please target the fall of 2022 for the 100-year anniversary.

Brian Doolittle '70 already had a good first impression of PIKE from his brother-in-law, **Jim Brinsley '59**, but once it came time for him to go through fraternity recruitment at Purdue, he realized there was much more to Beta Phi Chapter. Brian didn't need much convincing to move into Beta Phi's then-almost-new Chapter House after he got to know his brothers. More than 40 years after graduating from Purdue, he served as the campaign chairman to remodel the current Chapter House.



While serving on the Beta Phi Foundation for 12 years, it was important to Brian that Pikes at Purdue have opportunities for service and leadership.

"There's something that we call a servant leader," Brian said. "You most effectively lead people by serving them. You learn how to invest in others and, by investing in others, you will both be blessed in ways you can't even comprehend."

Brian experienced the highest highs and lowest lows as an undergraduate member. He always enjoys reminiscing about the 1970 semester break trip to Acapulco with six of his brothers. But Brian also remembers attending the

funerals for the four brothers who died in a car accident in 1969. Through it all he matured and remained dedicated to the fraternity.

"We had fun, but sometimes there were consequences from having too much fun. They were all learning experiences. As an upperclassman, I learned how to make decisions, gain confidence, and how to lead," Brian said. "We became good friends and brothers. I continued to build on my gifts that were developed when I was an undergraduate at Purdue and have taken advantage of those gifts during my career."

His career in the marketing and sales industry spanned more than 40 years, including stops at Unisys, Kirchman Corporation, Morton Metalcraft Co., and Red Lambda before retiring in 2013. Brian claims that one of his best hires was fellow Purdue Pike **Ryan Raber '05** at Morton Metalcraft Co. Today Ryan is with Mayville Engineering Company, where he's the executive vice president of sales, strategy, and marketing.

"I miss helping close that next big deal and particularly working with young professionals, but at the same time, I've always tried to teach balance in life," Brian said. "We even had

opportunities at our company to do a noon bible study, which is a great way to grow men. I tell people if you're going to judge my career, then let it be judged by the success of the people who have worked with me."

Brian continues to serve on several local boards and is an Elder at his church. Retirement has allotted him more time to travel with his wife, Julie, with whom he will celebrate 50 years of marriage later this year. "Last summer, we had the chance to go paragliding in the Swiss Alps," Brian said. "At 70, we're proving we've still got it. We're always looking for the next great adventure." One trip they always enjoy making is to Purdue to spend time with his brothers.

Home Association Navigates Housing Changes in Midst of Coronavirus Outbreak

It's impossible to provide an update from the Home Association without mentioning the current circumstances. Purdue University announced on March 10 that it would move to online-only classes starting March 23 and has consistently encouraged students to return home, including announcing a \$750 credit to those students that agreed to move out of the residence halls by March 30. The Home Association Board has attempted to match Purdue University's communications, and I contacted brothers and their parents on March 21, announcing that the Chapter House would close effective April 1, and we would endeavor to provide the same credit to our members as Purdue University was providing.

There are many unknowns at this time, including whether such credit is financially feasible, but the board remains committed to making responsible decisions in a timely manner, that prioritize the health and safety of the brothers we are charged with, which led to our decision to close the Chapter House. We understand that this is not an ideal ending to this academic year, but history tells us that the world will keep turning and, right or wrong, our decision will be judged. In the end, we wanted to be judged for a decision that prioritized our brothers over the financial repercussions of closing the house early.
